PROGRAMMATIC, FISCAL, AND REPORTING ASSURANCES

The United States Department of Education (USED) has approved the application from the State of Alabama for ESSER funds under the CARES Act. The availability of funds is from 4/29/2020 to 4/29/2021. LEAs will be allowed to expend funds until 9/30/2022. Pre-award costs to the ESSER fund will be allowed for allowable cost incurred on or after March 13, 2020.

2. Allowable Service(s) Assurance

The LEA Superintendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies that:

The LEA will use ESSER funds for activities allowable under section 18003(d) of Division B of the CARES Act. How will the LEA determine the most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19?

In response to the COVID shutdown, the OCS Leadership Team which includes administrators, principals, instructional coaches and teachers began meeting and continue to meet on a regular basis to determine the educational needs of our system as well as how to best meet the needs of our students and employees factoring in the amount of learning that was lost during the shutdown. The leadership team identified the following needs: instructional software/tech supplies, classroom instructional supplies, classroom instructional supplies, personnel costs related to distribution of technology and instructional supplies to students, personnel costs related to CNP cleaning and sanitation, and professional development on distence learning and canitation procedures.

How does the LEA intend to assess and address student learning gaps resulting from the disruption in educational services?

Learning gaps will be assessed using AlmswebPlus for grades K-3 and Scantron for grades 4-12. Additionally, teachers will administer formative and summative assessments. Information gained from these assessments will determine the Instructional needs of each student and those needs will be met accordingly using differentiated instruction. Instructional coaches have met to revise the pacing guides, front-loading missed standards. Teachers will monitor student work both on-line and in person. The district will move to a 2:1 initiative, providing two devices for each student; one at home and one in the classroom. This will allow for a minimum disruption in the event of future shutdowns.

What is the LEA's proposed timeline for providing services and assistance to students and staff?

Opelika City Schools began system-wide planning for the shutdown on March 12, 2020. Chromebooks were distributed to students for online learning beginning March 27, 2020 with online instruction beginning on March 30, 2020. Safety and health measures as well as online instructional support is ongoing and will continue for the foreseeable future. All funds requested will be expended by September 30, 2022.

How will the LEA use ESSER funds to promote remote learning?

We are putting into place a 2:1 technology device initiative to allow students to have a device both at home and at school. Various on-line platforms (Google Classroom Screencastify, etc.) are being utilized to assist with instruction and communication. Additionally, selected teachers are planning and developing instructional prototypes to be used by grade-span. These prototypes will improve the depth of on-line instruction and ensure quality instruction.

3. Equitable Services Assurances

Each private school in our district was contacted via certified mall and e-mail. The Oaks School is the only school that elected to participate in the funding. Initial consultation was held on June 17, 2020 via Google Meet with The Oaks School Director. The Oaks School submitted plans on June 18, 2020. Their plans include purchasing technology for distance learning and cleaning supplies/services to minimize the spread of COVID-19. The Equitable Services Implementation Agreement will be finalized no later than July 7, 2020 with services beginning shortly thereafter. The Equitable Services Implementation Agreement was revised and signed on April 13, 2021.

4. Other Assurances and Certifications

The LEA Superintendent or his/her authorized representative assures or certifies the following:

- The LEA that receives ESSER funds will, to the greatest extent practicable, continue to compensate its employees and contractors during the period of any disruptions or closures related to COVID-19 in compliance with Section 18006 of Division B of the CARES Act. In addition, LEAs that accept funds will continue to pay employees and contractors to the greatest extent practicable based on the unique financial circumstances of the LEA.  - (7) that in the case of any project involving construction -
 - (A) the project is not inconsistent with overall State plans for the construction of school facilities, and (B) in developing plans for construction, due consideration will be given to excellence of architecture and design and to compliance with standards prescribed by the Secretary under section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 in order to ensure that facilities constructed with the use of Federal funds are accessible to and usable by Individuals with disabilities;
- (8) that the local educational agency has adopted effective procedures for acquiring and disseminating to teachers and administrators participating in each program significant information from educational research, demonstrations, and similar projects, and for adopting, where appropriate, promising educational practices developed through such projects; and
